Waste Management in Newport and Rhode Island

The City of Newport's Clean City Program may be able to help you with recycling with our Lend-a-bin program. Up to 75 ClearStream event recycling bins are available to borrow through this program, through a grant from Keep America Beautiful & the Anheuser-Busch Foundation. The Clean City Program may also be able to help you recycle the materials collected at your event. Visit the [Clean City Program website](#) for more information. The Clean City Program can also provide a list of licensed solid waste haulers, who may be able to provide recycling services to your event.

Compost Hauling

[ecoRI Public Works](#): Collects compostables on a small scale, thereby creating nutrient-rich topsoil and reducing the amount of food scrap being needlessly buried in the Central Landfill.

PF Trading (<http://www.pftrading.com>) is a compost hauling company in southeastern Massachusetts. They will deliver 96 gallon compost bins to an event, then pick them up and haul them away after for a flat rate of \$18/bin. PF Trading can accept food scraps of any type, napkins, greasy cardboard from pizza boxes, compostable plates, cups, and utensils including plastic-style corn-based compostables. Leftover Food

Chances are you are going to have food leftover when your event ends. Donate it to a local group that can use it, such as the [RI Food Bank](#) or the [Food Recovery Network](#). Leftover food can also be donated to McKinney Lodge at Washington Square in Newport and the [Newport Boys and Girls Club](#). Otherwise, we suggest composting it.

Getting to Newport by Pubic Transportation

Bus service to many Newport sites is available from the Rhode Island Public Transit Authority (RIPTA). Get in touch with RIPTA on their website (www.ripta.com) or by calling (401) 781-9400. Please note: Newport buses start and end at the Gateway Center. Fares are \$2 with 1-day, weekly, and monthly passes are available as well.

The bus lines found in Newport are as follows:

1. The #60 Newport-Providence line provides frequent service, about 43 trips each way weekdays, which in Providence ends in Kennedy Plaza with access to intercity buses and Amtrak and MBTA commuter trains;
2. The #63 Purple Line serves the north end, along Broadway, Admiral Kalbfus Road, Connell and Coddington Highways to Newport Grand and Middletown shopping centers;
3. The #64 Newport-URI line also serves CCRI-Newport, Jamestown, the Route 1A park-and-ride, URI Bay and Kingston campuses, and the Kingston Amtrak train station;
4. The #67 Yellow Line serves Bellevue Avenue mansions, Salve Regina University, Cliff Walk access, the Tennis Hall of Fame, Newport Art Museum, Redwood Library and Touro Synagogue.

Packaging, Plate, Cups, and Utensils

The best way to keep waste out of the landfill at any event is to use real cups, plates, and utensils. If you cannot use real dinnerware, consider getting compostable plates, cups, and utensils; these items will make your event much greener. In that case, make sure they get composted; they are not a greener alternative if they end up in the landfill. Now that Rhode Island has a new recycling system, you can also consider buying Solo-style plastic cups and plates, which can be recycled now. Plastic utensils are still considered trash. Whole Foods on N. Main St. in Providence carries a line of compostable plates, bowls, and utensils from a company called World Centric. Alternatively, you can shop online for reasonably priced compostable kitchenware at Vegware (CT) or Branch (CA) at www.branchhome.com, or order online and pick up in person at Staples. Staples does not stock the eco kitchen products in their stores but can usually have them there the next day and charges no shipping for in-store pick-up.

Jennifer Rose Packaging Solutions: This Providence, RI based distributor offers a complete line of compostable, tableware, including cups, bowls, plates, utensils and take-out containers, for both hot and cold applications. number1package.com: Rhode Island-based Packaging 2.0 offers a new line called number1package™, including clamshell style containers that are clear, strong, and durable and keep foods fresh. The containers are made from 100 percent recycled PET (polyethylene terephthalate) clear or green soda bottles (the only company to offer this in the northeast). Clamshells carried by Toppa's Food Service (<http://www.toppasfoodservice.com>) in Middletown.

Soda Bottles and Cans

Yacht Club (www.yachtclubsoda.com) is made locally and will take back and reuse their glass bottles. If Yacht Club is not an option, avoid having individual soda bottles and cans at your event. Instead purchase 2 liter bottles because larger containers mean cheaper prices and less waste. Using

one reusable/disposable/recyclable/compostable cup during an event is much more environmentally friendly than recycling 2 or 3 soda cans.

Beer Bottles and Cans

Try to avoid beer bottles and cans by having kegs at your event instead. With a keg, a person can continue to fill one cup throughout an event instead of going through two, three, or four bottles. If you do not get a keg, opt for beer cans over bottles, since the material is lighter to ship and less hazardous to event attendees. RI-based breweries Gray Sail and Newport Storm sell their beer in cans.

Water Bottles

If the municipal tap water is safe to drink, save money on bottled water by filling up a few pitchers at the sink. If not, try to avoid having individual water bottles at your event. Buy gallon jugs of water, and then pour it into (refillable) cups. [Click here](#) to view alternatives to bottled water.

Zip 2 Water Systems (<http://www.zip2water.com>) dispense an unlimited supply of fresh, pure drinking water at outdoor athletic fields, job sites and community events. Their patent pending system ensures proper hydration without the expense and litter of disposable water bottles.

Portable toilets

Everyone is getting on the Green bandwagon, even the Port-O-Potty companies. Port-O-Potties generally use a whole bunch of unsafe chemicals, but many companies are offering safer alternative.

Energy Conservation and Greening Your Electricity

You can match your event's energy needs with People's Power & Light's New England Wind (www.ripower.org/greenevent). In addition to greening events, People's Power & Light's staff will often attend events to educate people about their green electricity programs.
